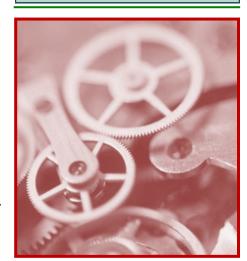

Research Grants awarded; plans underway for 2013 CSRC

70 undergraduate projects funded; graduate proposals accepted through spring

On November 2, IPSSP and the Undergraduate Research Grant Advisory Committee awarded letters to 70 undergraduate research projects. Altomitment of \$60,000 in funds allocated a competitive basis. to the program by President Ruud and the SU Foundation.

TIPS FOR GRANTSEEKERS

New year: new ideas?

How to tell a potential funder that your ideas are novel

Grantmakers want to know what is innovative about your project. Some agencies ask you to comment on your proposal innovativeness, and the reviewer guidelines require this feature to be assessed. How do you know an innovative proposal when you see one? Perhaps these key questions will lead you to the answer as you write your next proposal.

1.) Does the application challenge and seek to shift current research or practice paradigms by using novel theoretical concepts, approaches or methodologies, or instrumentation or inventions?

- methodologies, instrumentation, or interventions novel to one field of research, training, or service delivery or is it novel in a broad sense?
- 3.) Is a refinement, improvement, or new application of theoretical concepts, approaches or methodologies, instrumentation or interventions proposed?

An innovation introduces something new, and new is the key word to include in your discussion about the innovative features of your proposal. You may be introducing a new idea, device, or method. You can propose

2.) Are the concepts, approaches or an innovative product, strategy, technology, approach, or connection. Synonyms (nouns and verbs) include the following: brainchild, creation, create, invent, design, vision, conception, conceive, original, introduce, innovate, initiate, pioneer, make, create, produce, novel, unique, and special. Conceptually, the main sense of "innovation" is to create something new. Be sure to sprinkle these words and related synonyms into your next proposal.
