1. Do I have a Passport?

-A passport is essential document when traveling abroad. It is easy to apply for one and last for 10 years.



2. Where do I want to study abroad?

3. When do I want to go?

- Talk to your academic advisor about how to fit this into your academic experience.

4. Can I afford this?

-Talk to your parents about the possibility of studying abroad. The use of financial aid is also available. Estimates are available online from the International Programs office.

Recipe Of the Month

Brazilian Avocado Ice Cream

Ingredients:

3 medium ripe avocados (peeled and pitted)
2 tbsp. milk
1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
1/4 cup sugar
2 egg whites

Cooking Instructions:

1. Place the avocados, milk and vanilla extract in a blender.
2. Beat the eggs whites into soft peaks, adding sugar a little at a time.
3. Fold the egg mixture into the avocado mixture.

4. Pour into ice cube trays.

5. When mixture begins to freeze, remove from trays and beat until smooth.

Student Spotlight!



Ashwini Palande is an international student from Mumbai, India, and has been studying at Shippensburg University since the spring of 2009. Ashwini is currently majoring in Management of Information Systems (MIS), and is involved in the International Student Organization and the MIS club. In addition to being fluent in English, Hindi and Marathi, Ashwini can also speak a little bit of Spanish.

Since arriving in the United States Ashwini has travelled to New York, New Jersey, Baltimore, Washington D.C and Florida, and hopes to visit the West coast during her time here. Some of her favorite experiences during her stay in the U.S. have been snow tubing, and visiting Disney World. While off campus, she likes to visit museums, zoos and amusement parks as well as go hiking and bicycling. When asked if she has changed since coming to the United States, Ashwini says, “Since I have moved to the

US, I have become more independent, thoughtful and outgoing. I have learnt to utilize every opportunity made available to me and to contribute it towards my advantage. I have also become more focused towards my goals by inculcating in me all the values necessary and critical to achieve my goals.” What Ashwini misses most about her home country is her family and friends, but has been in close contact with them through means of internet chat, etc.

Adjusting to life in the United States can be challenging for any international student. Although English is her first language, Ashwini had to adjust to the various accents within the United States. However, Ashwini does not consider this her biggest challenge, she states that conforming to the weather of the east coast was her greatest challenge considering the extent to which it varies from the warm and humid climate back in India.

Ashwini’s advice to those planning on studying abroad is that, “Studying abroad gives students an opportunity to discover and get acquainted with people from other countries, their culture, values and lifestyles. Having a well-defined goal and the determination to overcome obstacles such as language, accent barriers, and cultural differences is a key to an enlightening experience abroad. Finally, keeping a positive outlook towards life contributes to success in life.”



Tips for Traveling in London, UK

For anyone planning on spending time in London it’s important to know how to get around the city. Here are a few tips on how to navigate London and get the most out of your experience.

- 1. Invest in an Oyster Card.** An oyster card is an easy way to buy a week pass or more for the Underground (aka: tube or subway). This allows tourist to save money and ride the tube and the bus system as much as they want without having to deal with tickets. For more information visit <http://www.tfl.gov.uk/>.
- 2. Always carry a map with you.** London is a big city and having a map of the city and the Underground handy will save lots of time and energy.
- 3. Leave early for your destination.** You never know if the tube is crowded or not so keep this in mind when planning trip to the theater, etc.
- 4. Pay attention to crosswalk signs.** There are three types of crossings in London. The “little green man” as soon as this light appears cross the street. The next are “zebra crossings” these are zigzag stripes on the road. Vehicles are required to stop for pedestrians. Although it is best to look both ways first and give them time to stop. If there are no visible markers you must look in the right direction before crossing, because of the high amount of tourist traffic in London they have posted “look right” and “look left” on the roads to keep pedestrians from walking into incoming traffic.
