### ENERGY JUSTICE IN INDIA AND ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE IN PENNSYLVANIA



Because we share a single global ecosystem and economy, practices in one place increasingly have impacts around the world. This presentation will trace connections between the USA's shale gas extraction (fracking) industry and energy poverty and climate change vulnerabilities in India.

**Heather Bedi** is assistant professor of Environmental Studies at Dickinson College. She researches how societies adapt to economically-produced environmental modifications, and serves on the PA Department of Environmental Protection's Environmental Justice Advisory Board.
